



WILDFLOWER GARDEN DRY HABITAT

Beginning in 1982, the NC Botanical Society and The Garden Club of North Carolina, Inc. have selected a native wildflower as Wildflower of the Year. These gardens contain all the past wildflowers and are divided into moist (garden 4) and dry (garden 6) habitats. In our Dry Habitat, enjoy our handcrafted Turk's Cap Lily and a bejeweled bird bath which invites local fauna to stop in for a drink.
