Beautiful Bears

The bridge will be a *beary* special place this fall when silhouettes of bears embellished with original artwork by the <u>Lake Lure Artists</u> will be on view throughout our gardens. The special feature, titled "Beautiful Bears," will be on display from September 11 through October 24.

So they'll be fit to withstand the weather, the 18-inchtall by 24-inch-wide bear cutouts are made from sanded and sealed marine grade plywood. After the artists applied their creative touches to the pieces, a topcoat was added for protection and attachments were secured to the backs of the frames so that the bears can either be hung or stand on a stick base.

Don't miss the opportunity to own one of these pieces of original artwork to display in your own home or garden. All of the bear silhouettes will be sold at an online auction via Bidding Owl, held October 15-24. Proceeds from the auction will benefit the Lake Lure Flowering Bridge. outdoor spaces, provided suitable plants, well draining potting soil and materials that will withstand being wet are chosen to create them. Planters to make vertical gardens are commercially available, however; online and printed resources provide a myriad of ideas for D.I.Y. vertical gardens. Kathy suggests using durable materials, such as PVC pipe, that can withstand being wet, or spraying protective coatings to waterproof homemade containers.

The highlight of the class was when attendees were invited to break into groups, and after a short demo, were encouraged to participate in planting one of three containers suitable for vertical gardening. This was followed by drawing names of three lucky winners, each leaving with a new garden creation.

Nowhere to Go but Up

Vertical gardens are gardens where plants grow up or out of a vertical structure, instead of in the ground. Examples on the Flowering Bridge include the "Mirror, Mirror on the Wall" attraction, as well as the "living roofs" of Petunia's Hideout and the doghouse in the River's Edge Dog Garden. Our hayrack planters, hanging baskets, tiered planters and plants growing on trellises are also samples of vertical gardens.

In her bridge-sponsored class, "Vertical Gardening and Living Walls," held last month on the LLFB's Welcome Terrace, Kathy Tanner, master gardener and garden cochair of the Flowering Bridge, shared her knowledge and experiences of creating vertical gardens and living walls. Vertical gardens can brighten both indoor and
